# **Key Information**

# The College

The College is an intensive program of practice exercises, enhanced by faculty demonstrations and personal supervision.

Enrollment is limited to 80 students, who are selected to participate by an application and registration process. A week before the College, students receive course materials simulating a case file, including police reports and witness statements. Preparation is essential because through the week students must try their own case, from jury selection to final argument.

A distinguished faculty member gives a brief lecture on the upcoming segment of the trial. Groups of eight, selected on the basis of experience level, then adjourn to separate classrooms to begin their videotaped exercises. Faculty members not only supervise the exercises but also critique the video performance with each student. Then, a faculty member particularly skilled in that area will present a demonstration to the entire group.

Some portion of each evening must be devoted to preparation for the next day but students and faculty are encouraged to eat together, get to know one another and exchange ideas.

## The Mission

The best lawyers are those who recognize and accept their position as defenders, not only of individual clients, but also of the fragile system of checks and balances that ensures freedom for us all. Thus, this College emphasizes the spirit and camaraderie of criminal defense.

The Criminal Defense Lawyers Project has been an endeavor of the Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association for over 45 years. It is funded by a grant from the Judicial and Court Personnel Training Fund administered by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

The purpose of the College is to promote efficient administration of criminal justice by providing training for lawyers to render effective assistance of counsel for indigent criminal defendants.

# The Faculty

Only experienced trial lawyers are invited to teach at this College. Invited faculty are among the most successful criminal trial lawyers in the state. However, the best lawyers have the busiest schedules so it is inevitable that a few will not be able to attend and that some will stay for only a couple of days.
